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From the Director

Dear Friends,

If you've been to the Beach Museum of Art lately, I hope you've noticed changes that are making the museum even more welcoming and enjoyable for all. This past spring we experimented with lunchtime offerings. The Cat Cart, operated by the K-State Student Union's Dining Services, made daily visits to the north-side entrance of the Beach, selling simple lunch fare. The café tables on the gallery level were put to good use by diners. On designated days, K-State music students performed a diverse series of informal

recitals, making lunch at the museum a very special treat. We hope to continue this experiment in the fall semester. Your support of the program will help it to grow and develop.

Collaboration hasn't been limited to the department of music. In fact, it's an integral part of the museum's planning and programming. A dedicated team with representatives from landscape architecture, plant biology, and facilities/grounds are working with the museum staff to develop a native plant garden in the currently grassy space between the Beach Museum and All Faiths Chapel. We are excited about the idea of featuring some of the same plants that appear in regional landscape paintings in the museum's collection and also for the student research opportunities this garden could offer.

This spring a rich, new program cycle was initiated on the campus: Creativity Illuminated. The centerpiece for this first year was a generous gift to the K-State Libraries by Warren and Mary Lynn Staley of a Heritage Edition of the St. John's Bible. This handfinished replica of the first hand-written and illuminated Bible to be created since the invention of printing was a springboard for explorations of the book arts, as well as the musical heritage shared by the three Abrahamic faiths: Christianity, Judaism, and the Sufi tradition of Islam. Some of you experienced the wonderful round of community programs presented by the Yuval Ron Ensemble and attended the group's inspiring concert at McCain Auditorium or the calligraphy workshop at the museum. Under the umbrella of Creativity Illuminated the Beach Museum of Art, Hale Library, McCain Auditorium, Leadership Studies, and other campus units are already planning future programs that celebrate creative traditions.

I hope you'll visit the museum often and that you'll find something new and interesting whenever you come.

Exhibitions

Quiet Symmetry: The Ceramic Art of Yoshiro Ikeda

April 17 – September 2, 2012 Marion Pelton Gallery

Since 1978, when he arrived in Manhattan as a young artist fresh out of graduate school, Yoshiro Ikeda has been one of the most popular professors in Kansas State University's department of art. He was honored by the university in 2004 with the title of distinguished professor, and he has enjoyed a national reputation as an educator, receiving in 2010 the top teaching award from NCECA (the National Council on Education for the Ceramic Arts).

This spring, as Ikeda's long and productive career at Kansas State University comes to a close, his accomplishments as a professor and his prominence as an artist in clay are celebrated in an exhibition that includes examples of his work from the last three decades.

Ikeda was born in Kagoshima, Japan, in 1947. As a boy he received instruction in Zen meditation and calligraphy before immigrating with his family to the United States.

With the help of a scholarship from Japan's Ministry of Education, Ikeda returned to his native land in 1970 to study with the famous ceramic artist Yagi Kazuo at the Kyoto Geidai (Kyoto City College of Fine Arts). Yagi's energetic use of clay to produce sculptural vessels left a lasting impression on Ikeda. Soon the student was throwing large, asymmetrical forms on the wheel and enhancing their expressive properties by texturing their surfaces and covering them in glazes mixed with odd ingredients such as soy sauce.

In addition to his signature colossal teapots encrusted in trailings of glaze, "Quiet Symmetry," includes sculptural vessels inspired by the seasonal colors of the Flint Hills, the geological formations of the American Southwest, and the 1980 eruption of Mount St. Helens in Washington State.

Ikeda's quietly expressive art has been exhibited in hundreds of venues nationally and in countries as diverse as Korea, Brazil, Scotland, and New Zealand. Despite his fame as an artist, Ikeda is proudest of his legacy of mentoring generations of ceramists who received their degrees at K-State. Work from the department of art and the museum's permanent collection by some of Ikeda's most successful former students will be installed in the nearby Hyle Family Gallery.

Exhibitions

Goodnight Moon: Selections from the Permanent Collection

June 5 – December 23, 2012 Ruth Ann Wefald Gallery

From starlit staircases and moon glow to glowing sparklers and carnival lights, this exhibition explores the many facets of night. The exhibition topic was chosen to compliment the "Dream Big" theme for the Kansas Library Association summer reading program.

The selections include idyllic moonlit scenes by Kansas artists Birger Sandzén and Lisa Grossman and more conceptual pieces such as Jeff Mongrain's *An Evening's Breath*, a clay pillow which holds the amount of moisture exhaled during a night's sleep. Contemporary images of night include views of porches, airports, and highways lit by lights.

Visitors can travel to the stars via a lithograph of Skylab by industrial designer Raymond Loewy, who worked for NASA from 1967 to 1973 as a habitability consultant to help insure the comfort of astronauts. Heavenly bodies are represented in *Autumn Planets* by Tony Fitzpatrick, *Prairie Moon* by Vernon Brejcha, *Nebula* by Lee Chesney, and a series of *Alien Planets* by Indian artist RM Palaniappan.


All the images invite the visitor to fly to the moon and back! For those wishing to travel further, the museum's Exploration Station will feature books and activities, and ARTSmart classes and tours will focus on the exhibition.

Konza

July 9, 2012 – May 2013 Stolzer Family Foundation Gallery

Konza, a large kinetic sculpture inspired by the natural beauty and movement of the nearby Konza prairie, is the newest addition to the Beach Museum of Art's permanent collection. This powerful metal work reflects a set of contrasting themes: the natural and the manmade, the internal and external, the small and the vast, the permanent and the fleeting. Located in the Stolzer Family Foundation Gallery, the sculpture was commissioned specifically for the Beach Museum of Art.

"Sometimes we see the natural world in a new way after seeing an artist's representation. This wonderful work by John Powers may be mechanical, but it evokes features of the natural tallgrass prairie that we treasure as a Kansas icon," says Linda Duke, museum director.

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
